Bodmin and Wenford Railway

Bodmin General Station, Bodmin, PL31 1AQ Approx. 33 mins



Discover the nostalgia of steam travel, with a journey back in time on Cornwall's leading full-size railway operated by steam locomotives.

Relax in style and enjoy a leisurely 13-mile round trip, taking in the sights, sounds and smells of a bygone age, as the era of a Cornish branch line in the 1950s reveals itself during the course of your journey.

Trains operate from Bodmin General, the principal station where free coach and car parking is available, to both Bodmin Parkway station – where connections can be made directly with main line railway services – and Boscarne Junction, which is situated directly adjacent to the Camel Trail recreational footpath and cycle way.

Passenger train services operate throughout the year, and regularly from late March to early October.

Just a 10-minute walk from the town centre, we are proud to be one of Cornwall's dog-friendly attractions!

Dairyland Farm Park

Fowey Aquarium

Town Quay, Fowey, PL23 1AT Approx. 43 mins



The Aquarium is situated on the historic Fowey Town Quay, and gives a fascinating glimpse into the marine life found around the Cornish coast. Although the aquarium is small in size, our visitors are constantly amazed by the variety of marine creatures on display.

In addition to a wide range of fish from the tiny gobies and shannies from the shallows up to conger eels which inhabit deep wrecks, there are various types of crabs and lobsters lurking in the corners!

Children will especially enjoy the touch pool where they can pick up a shore crab or have their fingers tickled by prawns.

First established in 1952, the aquarium still retains many of the original tanks. Fresh sea water is pumped in daily at high tide and the filtration is minimal.

This is a mixed blessing as keeping the clarity of the water acceptable is difficult at times but on the plus side are the various creatures such as seasquirts, sponges and tube worms that arrive as plankton in the water and grow on in the aquarium.

Lammana Chapel

Hannafore, West Looe Approx. 20 min Walk



At the end of Marine Drive, Hannafore, go through the gate and follow the South West Coast Path.

On the hillside to your right are the remains of St Michael of Lammana Chapel, a medieval chapel.

To reach the site, you must follow a steep incline up the hill. As you begin to climb, look to your right and you will see the remaining wall of a monk's house that was part of the original settlement. At the site you will have an uninterrupted view across the bay to its sister site on Looe Island. The first known documentation about the chapel was in 1144, in a papal confirmation.

In 2008, Time Team visited Looe and undertook an excavation of this site that showed that there was human habitation here before Roman Times as well as some pottery from the 13th century. It was originally believed that this chapel was built to replace one on Looe Island, but during the excavation it became clear that at one point in their history they operated at the same time. It was also established that both chapels are built at the same height. The chapel was Benedictine, and belonged to Glastonbury Abbey until 1290, when it became a private chantry chapel belonging to a local family.

During its time as part of Glastonbury Abbey, it was popular with pilgrimages for Michaelmas. The chapel was demolished in 1549, in Henry VIII's Dissolution of the Monasteries.

Looe Island Trips

Boats from the quay, East Looe Approx. 10 mins. Walk



Looe Island (or St Georges Island to give it its official name) is off the coast of Looe. This island was once the site of a Benedictine Chapel belonging to Glastonbury Abbey, with a sister site opposite the island at the start of the South West Coast Path.

In the 1950's, two sisters Barbara and Evelyn Atkins, brought the island to live on. Barbara taught at the local secondary school while Evelyn wrote two books about living on the island. Upon their deaths, the island was bequeathed to the Cornwall Wildlife Trust.

Looe Island is a marine nature reserve and the waters around it are teaming with life. The island provides a quiet haven for wildlife, with a variety of habitats.

Looe Island is part of the Whitsand and Looe Bay Marine Conservation Zone (MCZ) and has a variety of precious wildlife habitats including woodland, maritime, grassland, sand, shingle and rocky reef.

Looe Island can only be reached by boat and only authorised boats are allowed to land.

Looe Valley Line

Station Road, East Looe PL13 1HN Approx. 10 min Walk



Why not take a trip on the Looe Valley Train. It is said to be one of the most picturesque lines in the country.

The track follows the estuary for part of the journey, before going through some of the small villages along its route.

This is a good way to enjoy the scenery without having to drive. The train takes you from Looe to Liskeard where you can take a stroll into town for some shopping.

It takes approximately 10 minutes to get to the town centre with its variety of shops, bars and restaurants.

If you are not feeling that energetic, just remain on the train for its return journey to Looe.

Old Guildhall Museum and Gaol

Higher Market Street, East Looe PL13 1AA Approx. 15 mins Walk



The Old Guildhall Museum and Gaol is contained in a 15th century listed building with a fascinating display of the history of Looe.

The building itself is a marvellous exhibit on its own, as it retains many of its medieval features, with ancient cells and the original raised magistrates bench, complete with the Royal Coat of Arms, from when the local court was held there.

You can enjoy an Augmented Reality experience, a pilgrimage to Looe Island game, the Court and Gaol, stories of Court cases from the past which you can act out at the Magistrates Court. Plus regalia and stories of WWI and WWII, a display of the canal and railway in Looe, RNLI artefacts and an ancient smuggling cabinet.

The museum is spread over two floors, and you enter via the upper floor of the building, which from 1587 to 1878, was the East Looe Town Hall and Magistrates Court. Beneath the magnificent timber-framed roof, laws were made and enforced, and the town was administered by the Mayor and Corporation, known as Burgesses.

Downstairs, you will find the two cells used to hold the criminals of Looe in the past. This really was a case of 'send them down' from the court above!

Pinetum Gardens is a place of tranquility, peace, spectacular garden scenery.

The largest modern garden created in Cornwall, and family owned, the gardens offer an intimate experience with a personal touch rarely found in our busy world.

Lovingly created over the past four decades, this idyllic 30-acre garden is home to one of the largest plant collections in the county spread over ten individual themed garden rooms within a breath-taking landscape.

The gardens are also home to some of the county's 67 most spectacular Champaign trees.

Polperro Heritage Museum of Smuggling and Fishing

A small museum located right on the harbourside of the beautiful fishing village of Polperro.

The museum contains a fascinating insight into the history of fishing and smuggling from the late 18th century to date. It houses a remarkable collection of photos dating from around 1860. The collection is complemented by a wonderful collection of model ships.

Family history is also well catered for with records available for viewing.

The museum is housed in what was the Old Pilchard Factory until the early 20th century.

Polperro Model Village

Mill Hill, Polperro PL1 32RP Approx 13 mins



No visit to Cornwall would be complete without a visit to the famous Polperro Model Village and Land of Legend.

As you pass through the gates into the Model Village, you enter a true village in miniature. Feel like a giant, as the village spreads out at your feet and you will see many of the features which have made Polperro so famous.

Unlike many model villages, here you will see the reproduction of the actual village of Polperro reduced to scale, which enables you to appreciate an arial view of this beautiful, quaint, ancient fishing village.

As you walk the narrow winding streets with ancient buildings, following in the footsteps of smugglers who moved under the cloak of darkness, the past envelopes the visitor unashamedly.

The Polperro Model Village has been entertaining visitors to Polperro since the late 1940's. Having survived fire and floods, this famous Cornish attraction continues to delight families of all ages.

A visit might include: wandering around our interactive Discovery Centre, exploring historic trails, woodland walks in grounds teeming with wildlife, and spectacular views of a modern working clay pit.

Immerse yourself in the atmospheric grounds of the original Victorian clay works, bursting at the seams with tools, machinery, artefacts and stories. Discover Wheal Martyn's past life at the heart of this global industry. Hear real life tales of the industry which shaped the landscape and iconic 'Cornish Alps', and of the people in mid-Cornwall and beyond, whose lives were shaped by this 'white gold'.
